<p><u>Features of the Religious Settlement</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Act of uniformity/Act of Supremacy/
<p><u>Challenges to her rule in 1558</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • From abroad and home; abroad (France, Mary Queen of Scots), ; home- religion, legitimacy, finances
<p><u>Catholic opposition:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pope (excommunication), Mary Queen of Scots, plots and Revolt of the Northern Earls

American West:

<p>Fort Laramie Treaty 1851</p>
<p><u>Destruction of the traditional way of life of the Plains Indians in the years 1876-c1895.</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Battle of Little Big Horn, Dawes Act • life on reservations • Wounded Knee Massacre 1890
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Manifest Destiny • Homestead Act • Development of Abilene as part of the cattle industry

<p><u>Type of punishment 1500-present</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • deterrence/retribution/rehabilitation • corporal and capital •
